

Teaching styles at university

- Can be quite varied depending on your course
- Lessons can be larger and longer
- More informal than lessons in school
- Require more input from students and independent work











- Presentation by a lecturer or professor
- More formal and less discussion based
- Often held in large lecture theatres with lots of other people
- Student are required to listen and take notes



Seminars



- Smaller group sessions
- Classrooms similar to school
- Interactive and discussion based
- Preparation: read chapter before class, create a small presentation





- Lab work
- Workshops
- Field work or field trips
- Computer sessions

- You can choose how you like to take notes:
 - Pen and paper
 - Tablet or Laptop (Word document, annotation)
 - PowerPoint notes
- Might not take notes
- Focus on lecture and create notes later
 - Lecture recordings
 - PowerPoint/pdf/lecture resources available on Blackboard

How is writing at university different than in school?

1. You will have to include where you sourced your information in assessments



True

- Your will have to <u>reference</u> your sources in your assignments
- Referencing is acknowledging the sources of information you used to make your arguments
- Different departments require different methods
- Usually need to put a citation in the text and a bibliography (list of sources at the end of your assignment)



2. The essays you write at university are similar to the ones you write at school

Yes and No

- Similar structure (Introduction, Main arguments, Conclusion)
- Might be asked to use new structures
- Have to use <u>academic writing</u>
- Formal, clear and precise, third person
- More in-depth analyses and critical evaluation
- Wide range of evidence and sources



3. You might have to write about your own experiences and evaluate them



True

- Reflective writing is a type of academic writing
- Involves analysing your past practical experiences and applying what you learnt into the future
- More personal can write in first person
- Might be part of an assignment (end of a laboratory report)
- Reflective account of a placement



4. You are expected to know how to write at university level when you enroll



False

- First year is about learning academic skills including academic writing
- Different styles and elements are taught (referencing, analytical writing)
- Assessment briefs include how you are expected to write in an assignment
- Libguides online resources and library workshops

Writing styles summary



- At university you have to write in an academic writing style
- Formal, precise, 3rd person (except in reflective writing)
- Analyses and critically evaluate your points more deeply
- Have to use a wide range of evidence and reference them in your essays/reports
- There are resources at the university to help you learn these skills

In 6th form/college/school

- Websites (Wikipedia, blogs)
- Educational websites (Bitesize)
- Books and textbooks

University

- Academic literature (journey articles or books)
- Government/ Company reports/Laws
- Sources are reliable and objective

Academic literature example - Journal article


- Research done by others published in an academic journal
- Academic journals (peer reviewed journals where researchers can share their work to other academics)
- Online article databases or research platform eg Google scholar



How is researching for assignments different at university?



- Academic literature eg journal articles
- Focused reading
 - Don't need to read the entire text every time
 - Articles have specific structure and need to include specific things eg aims and hypothesis
 - Only need to read certain section first abstract, introduction, conclusion
 - If these are useful you could read the rest method, result, discussion
- Synthesize and critically evaluate information
 - Find common themes
 - Assess the usefulness and credibility of findings
 - Don't just describe what you have read



Questions about researching



When do students need to research topics?

- For most assignments (essays, reports, presentations)
- Dissertation
- Literature review
 - Finding out what has already been researched in your topic
 - Reading, analysing common themes, identifying gaps and writing
 - Separate assignment or part of a bigger project

Where to find sources for researching?

- Online article databases or research platform
 - Web of Science, Google Scholar and others
 - University pays for subscription
- Library and academic librarians for each department



Summary
